As Alice, she serves as a spokesperson for Wisconsin agriculture, working to educate audiences of all ages through media interviews, school visits and event presentations. In one year, Linder will travel more than 40,000 miles, working on behalf of Wisconsin farmers to promote the state's agriculture.

ACTIVITY

Christine talks about the importance of sharing the story of agriculture and making connections with consumers face-to-face, through the media, and using the latest communication tools. She wants to help consumers understand that foods found on the grocery store shelf first start on farms.

 Ask students to share their story in two or more paragraphs. The story can be about the livestock, crops, etc. that they produce, and how they care for the land and animals while doing so. Or they could choose to tell their FFA story - how have experiences in FFA impacted their life?

ACTIVITY

STUDENTS WILL USE THE FOLLOWING SCENARIO TO COMPLETE THE **ACTIVITY:**

ACTIVITY SHEET

- Motivates new potential young members to want to join (describe why this would motivate others to join).
